<u>Course Description:</u> The goal of this course is to provide graduate students with training in application of the APA Code of Ethics, as well as the State of New Jersey, and Federal laws, as they pertain to the provision of psychotherapy, assessment and research. In doing so, we aspire to train students in positive or active ethics, which reach beyond the minimal standards of competency that are based on legal or mandatory ethics code, by training psychologists to act based on moral sensitivity or aspirational principles, grounded in the fundamental goal of helping others. Clinical Ethics I and II were developed in tandem with Proseminar I and II to ensure that students simultaneously receive training in the APA Ethics Code as it pertains to the provision of clinical care as well as research activities.

<u>Course Format:</u> This is a required 1.5 credit course that will be offered in both the Fall and Spring semesters. This class is <u>required</u> for second-year students in the Doctoral Program in Clinical Psychology, and is to be taken in the fall semester and followed by Clinical Ethics II in the spring semester. This course will also be open on a case-by-case basis for additional students.

**General Objectives:** The goal of this series of courses is to provide pre-doctoral clinicians with:

- 1) Knowledge of the APA Ethics Code as it pertains to the clinical and research activities.
- 2) Training in the use of a positive approach to ethics, based upon morals and an aspirational code of conduct that reach beyond fundamental standards of conduct.

## **Specific Teaching and Training Goals for Ethics I:**

Teaching:

- Students should have expertise of the APA Ethics Code (Standards 1-5) as well as New Jersey state and Federal laws.
- Through class discussion and didactive experiences, students will learn to distinguish between ethical standards and aspirations, that reach beyond what is legally required as a practicing psychologist.

Applied Practice:

- o Students should demonstrate competency in ethical standards and disciplinary codes.
- Students should demonstrate a willingness and desire to employ a code of professional ethics that reaches beyond mandatory guidelines, incorporating a personal and moral framework focused on helping others.

<u>Classroom Decorum:</u> Please make your best effort to arrive on time! Please be respectful. This means, refrain from using social media apps during class, turn off cell phones upon arrival to class (not vibrate, not silent), and refrain from side conversations.
