We are pleased to announce a new degree program, taught by our esteemed faculty, in Applied Psychology. This 42-credit program for a ***Master of Applied Psychology (MAP)*** degree offers students instruction in *foundation* knowledge of the scientific basis of psychology and education and training in *applied* areas of psychology. The program embraces the mission of GSAPP by providing instruction with an emphasis on civic and global citizenship, social justice, and cultural diversity.

The MAP degree prepares students with the requisite theoretical knowledge as well as critical thinking and problem solving skills needed to successfully participate in professional activities. Students will have opportunities to pursue scholarly activities that prepare them to successfully compete for admissions into doctoral level psychology programs or pursue Master's level career pathways through available concentrations and certificate programs. Currently, there are **three tracks** within the MAP degree program: 1. Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) 2. Addiction Studies (can lead to LCADC in NJ) 3. General track (for those unsure, or wishing to pursue doctoral training)

Admissions Requirements:

Minimum 3.0 GPA in Undergraduate or Associate degree transcripts. Two letters of recommendation. A professional Statement. Transcripts from all previously attended schools. Prerequisite courses: General Psychology, Statistics and one additional psychology elective (for example: Personality, Abnormal Psychology, Social Psychology or Developmental Psychology) General GRE scores are required with minimum standards ranging from average to approximately one standard deviation above average.
