Course Objectives:

- (a) to provide students with an integrative overview of the field of abnormal psychology and major psychological problems and disorders;
- (b) to familiarize students with the multiple causes of psychopathology as viewed from a number of different theoretical perspectives;
- (c) to illustrate an integrative view of research in the area of abnormal behavior;
- (d) to discuss intervention and prevention strategies for psychological disorders;
- (e) to promote critical thinking skills in the area of abnormal psychology.

Policies:

Attendance: Students are expected to attend all classes and remain present for the entire duration of class. If you need to leave early, please sit in the back of the room so you can exit without disturbing other students.

Behavior: Everyone has their own learning style. Make sure yours is not disruptive to others around you. Do not engage in loud conversation with others, and of course, cell phones and laptops should be on silent. Students who are disruptive may be asked to leave.

Class participation: Class participation will be assessed via iClickers. You will need the iClicker-2. I will be asking several questions per class, and you will be graded on whether you responded. If you answer 75% of the questions in a given class, you will receive full credit for that class. Please note: If you are found using more than one clicker during class, all who are involved will receive an F for the participation portion of their grade. (If you purchase a used clicker, make sure to replace batteries immediately. Batteries last approximately one academic year, and you don't want to be in the middle of the class when the batteries die.)

Assignments: After every class you will have an Aplia assignment. This will be explained in detail in class.

Exams: On the exams you will be responsible for all material in the textbook. Additionally, any material covered in class may appear on the exam as well.

Missed exams: Students may only miss an exam for a documented reason (in writing). You must have a letter from a dean, doctor, etc.

Recording classes: Recording the class in any audio or visual manner is strictly forbidden without explicit written permission from the instructor.
