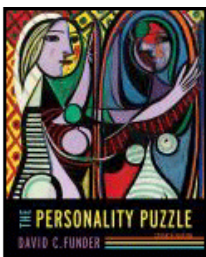

Course Description and Objectives

Examination of major personality theories and contributing research evidence with particular emphasis upon motivation and dynamics of behavior. In addition, exploration of original essays addressing the major theoretical movements in personality.

- Describe and differentiate among the major psychological approaches which explain personality.
- Define and apply key personality concepts, terms, and theories.
- Identify and read original essays from the psychologists who have made major contributions to an understanding of personality.
- Explain research methodology and the ability to evaluate the merit of personality studies.
- Practically apply acquired insight of personality to one's own life

TEACHING PHILOSOPHY:

My bias is to explore content areas in depth, as opposed to giving superficial coverage to many areas. If time becomes a limiting factor, changes in the schedule will reflect that bias. Thus, topic areas and readings may be dropped or added, depending upon time constraints. I believe education is a cooperative enterprise in which you have an active role. Therefore, I want to encourage an active participation on your part during the course. Please don't hesitate to respond, question, and challenge. To facilitate this process, I will occasionally ask you to take part in experiential exercises or discussion groups. CLASS PARTICIPATION

WRITING ASSIGNMENT

If I cannot open your assignment, you will receive a 0.

The required assignment must be uploaded to assignments tab (not emailed) by **August 14! Be sure to submit before 11:55pm as the assignments tab will close.**

In this paper, describe a character from a movie, TV show or book from the perspective of at least two theories discussed in this course, each from a different approach (you can choose from the following: 1) triat 2) biological, 3) psychoanalytic 4) existential and 5) learning, thinking feeling and then conclude with your own impression. The paper should be no shorter than 3 pages and no longer than 7 pages in length (double-spaced, 12 pt. font, Times New Roman, 1" margins). In this paper you should a) describe the character from a book, movie or show b) describe this person from at least two theories we've covered in this course (each from a different approach) c) summarize and present your opinion about how well these theories describe the person in question.

Please divide you paper into the following sections and clearly label each of the following

- 1) Make sure to use the specific **theory** rather than the approach in general. Describe your character from these theories that are from different domains covered in the course. Give specific examples from the characters life that can be used to describe the individuals personality through the lens of the theory. **(30 points-15 points for each theory)**
- 2) For each perspective, indicate the aspects of the characters personality that cannot be described through each theory. For example, are there aspects of the character that the five-factor, Freud, Bandura, etc. is not able to describe? **(10 points)**
- 3) Include reasons for why your character may have developed their personality (genetics, family, environment, etc.). Speculate based on the characters situation, family, genetics, upbringing, etc. **(7 points)**
- 4) In-text citations and a reference page **(3 points)**

Be sure to include references to the book and course material. You must use in-text citations and a reference page (you do not need a title page or abstract).

Cheating and Plagiarism

Short version: Don't cheat. Don't plagiarize.

Longer version: Cheating on tests or plagiarizing materials in your papers deprives you of the educational benefits of preparing these materials appropriately. It is personally dishonest to cheat on a test or to hand in a paper based on unacknowledged words or ideas that someone else originated. It is also unfair, since it gives you an undeserved advantage over your fellow students who are graded on the basis of their own work. In this class we will take cheating very seriously. All suspected cases of cheating and plagiarism will be automatically referred to the Office of Judicial Affairs, and we will recommend penalties appropriate to the gravity of the infraction. The university's policy on Academic Integrity is available at <http://academicintegrity.rutgers.edu/academic-integrity-policy>¹ I strongly advise you to familiarize yourself with this document, both for this class and for your other classes and future work. To help protect you, and future students, from plagiarism, we require all papers to be submitted through Turnitin.com.

Since what counts as plagiarism is not always clear, I quote the definition given in Rutgers' policy:

Plagiarism: Plagiarism is the use of another person's words, ideas, or results without giving that person appropriate credit. To avoid plagiarism, every direct quotation must be identified by quotation marks or appropriate indentation and both direct quotation and paraphrasing must be cited properly according to the accepted format for the particular discipline or as required by the instructor in a course. Some common examples of plagiarism are:

- Copying word for word (i.e. quoting directly) from an oral, printed, or electronic source without proper attribution.
- Paraphrasing without proper attribution, i.e., presenting in one's own words another person's written words or ideas as if they were one's own.
- Submitting a purchased or downloaded term paper or other materials to satisfy a course requirement.
- Incorporating into one's work graphs, drawings, photographs, diagrams, tables, spreadsheets, computer programs, or other nontextual material from other sources without proper attribution.²

Option 3: Engage in a class debate (5 points) I have included 4 debate issues on Sakai along with time slots under the "sign up" tab.

- 1) Read the issue and decide if you would like to participate in the "yes" or "no" arguments.
- 2) Sign up for a time slot under the debate in which you wish to engage. There is a maximum of 3 people for each time slot.
- 3) Read the essay and prepare for a debate on stage with students presenting the other side of the issue.
- 4) You do not need to submit your arguments, but they should be well-thought out and logical.

Option 4: Article Summaries (4 points)-make sure to include information from the course (use the book as the reference) to expand on the concepts presented in the articles. YOU MUST REFERENCE COURSE MATERIAL.

- 1) Find 2 articles relating to one of the topics we are studying in the popular press (Psychology Today, Scientific American Mind, New York Times, Time magazine, etc.-I will be posting interesting articles on the FB site)
- 2) Summarize (about 1.5 pages each) the article and **be sure to include how it relates to the topic covered in class.**
- 3) Make sure that you include in-text references along with a reference page -in proper APA style.
- 4) The articles do not have to be related to each other.

For option 4: you will need to present information from the course and use the book as the reference. I will be running the assignments through Turnitin-please be sure not to plagiarize.

Option 1: Trait Psychology (5 points)

Here are the steps required to complete the exercise.

1. Go to <http://www.personal.psu.edu/faculty/j/5/j5j/IPIP/>
2. Click "Follow this link if you wish to complete the original IPIP-NEO"
3. Go to the 4th "bulleted" line on the page and click "take the shorter version"
4. Click "yes" to both queries on the page that comes up, go to the bottom of the page and click SEND. That will activate the first 60 items of the test.
5. Look over your results and write brief paper (3 pages) about how accurately you think the results describe your personality. Include your impressions of the system's primary strengths and weaknesses in terms of describing you and as a research tool in personality psychology. **You must also address comparisons to your MBTI results**

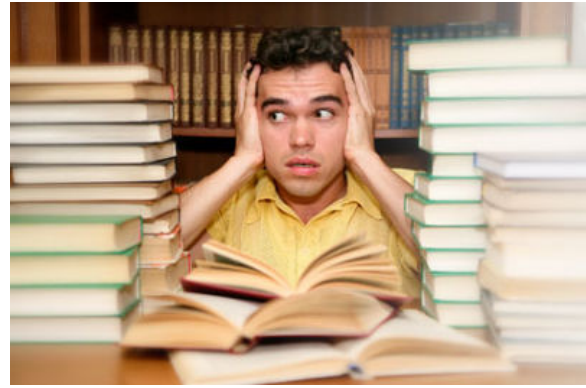
Option 2: Personal narrative (5 points) Tell the story of your life through song. Create an imaginary soundtrack depicting your past, present and future.

- 1) Create an "imaginary soundtrack" to your life and write a reflective paper that explains why each song is included.
- 2) Make sure that you have 6 events, each accompanied by a soundtrack.
- 3) The reflective paper should be at least 3 double spaced pages including all 6 soundtracks. Include the actual lyrics of the songs at the end of paper (the lyrics themselves are not part of the 3 pages).

Inevitably every semester there are students who are not happy with their grades and seem to not be concerned until the day before the final. Please do not put yourself in that position and make sure that you keep up with the class throughout the semester. The following are some tips on how you should study for the exams:

If you want to learn the subject matter well, read the assigned material before the lecture, review the power points after the lecture, quickly go over it again a day or two later, and then re-read the notes and the chapter for a few days before the exam. Memory researchers have established that you will understand and remember something better by studying it several times spread out over days than by studying the same amount of time all at once. Also, of course, the more total time you spend studying, the better.



When you study, don't just read the text and lecture notes but stop and think about the material. The more actively you use the material, the better you will remember it. Also test yourself using flashcards. Go through the lecture notes and write the name of the concept on the front and the definition on the back. Don't worry about memorizing the definition word for word as it would be better to try to use each word in a sentence or think of examples for each term.

HOW TO DO WELL IN THIS CLASS:

- Attend class and answer the clicker questions.
- Complete every quiz on time.
- Read the assigned material carefully and closely, taking notes in your own words. Stop after each paragraph or two and make sure you understand the important points. You should end up with many pages of notes for each chapter, which are now your study materials. Outline the chapters in your own words with information from the book and lecture.
- Access the materials on Sakai
- At least a week before the exam, begin studying your notes on the readings and your notes from class. Get more information about concepts you do not understand by contacting me
- Work actively with the course material: develop your own examples of concepts; explain in your own words how certain topics in psychology are studied; draw models of the concepts; organize the material in each chapter in ways that make sense for you; compare your class notes to the textbook; etc.
- Contact me to ask questions or just to talk about the material. I would be happy to look at your notes and study materials to see if I have any advice for you.
- Work productively during class. During class we will actively analyze, apply, and evaluate the text material.
