Rutgers University The Collaborative Service Learning Internship Recitation Syllabus Fall 2018

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Office Hours: By appointment

Course Description: This is an optional 2-credit online service-learning course for students who have already participated in the CESEP course in a previous semester. This is a placement through Rutgers' Collaborative Center for Community-Based Research and Service that is associated with an Acelero/PRAB/Douglass/Millhill placement. It is also associated with the Community Psychology and Mental Health, Atypical Child and Adolescent Development, and Infant and Child Development courses.

The purpose of the recitations is to provide students with a format to reflect on the work they are doing at their placements and to find deeper meaning in their contributions to the community. Often individuals dedicate much time to volunteering and doing good work within different organizations and settings without a space to share their experiences and troubleshoot the challenges they face. These recitations present students working with Acelero, PRAB, Douglass, or Millhill the unique opportunity to learn from each other and to strengthen their sense of civic engagement. Students are encouraged to reference the Sakai site frequently in order to stay on top of their assignments.

Because students in this course have already completed the CESEP course, they are not required to meet in person for recitations. Instead of the in-person recitations, students are asked to participate in more written and online activities. See below for more details.

Course Requirements:

- 1. <u>Service Hours:</u> A total of at least 30 hours is required at the placement. This is typically completed over 10 weeks, at 3 hours a week. *If students miss a day for any reason, they are responsible for arranging make-up hours.* Students are required to record hours on the **Time Sheet** document. This log must be submitted by December 17th.
- 2. <u>Community Paper:</u> Students write a 2-page paper exploring the community that they will be working in. Discuss the population, ethnic makeup, religion, socio-economic status and how all of these factors can influence the children in these preschools. Look up information online or in books. A lot of the town websites will have demographic information that can be used. This will allow students to get a better understanding of the community they are working in and how that impacts the students they are working with. Due on October 1st. Comment on Sakai question is due by October 8th.

- 3. <u>Classroom Lesson:</u> Students conduct a lesson in the classroom. All students should be in classrooms with their original teachers so they should be more willing to let students take on more responsibilities. The lesson could be on any activity that the teacher has come up with or the student has identified. Write a 2-page summary on what the lesson was and how it went. Due on October 22nd. Comment on Sakai question is due by October 29th.
- **1.** Teacher Interview: Students write a 2-3 page paper after they have interviewed the teacher they work with (some content written will also be based on classroom observations). Talk to the teachers about what they do in the classroom, what their training was to get there, what some of the challenges in their particular setting are, what they find to be rewarding, etc. Students should also write a paragraph or two talking about their observations. This is not meant to be critical or negative, rather it is to give students a better idea of what it is like to work with these students in a specific setting. Due on November 12th. Comment on Sakai question is due by November 19th.
- **5.** Goodbye Project: This project is an exercise that students will design for their last on-site visit at their placements. This entry should be 3-5 pages summarizing the project as well as the totality of the CESEP experience. Students should NOT do the same activity that they did previously. See Goodbye Project document under Resources tab on Sakai for details. Due on December 17th.
- **6.** <u>Participation:</u> Students will need to respond to each of the three questions on Sakai regarding each of the different assignments (you will not need to do this for the Goodbye Project). Responses should be at least a paragraph in length. Students can comment on my question or someone else's response to my question. This is a critical component of the class as we are not meeting in person to have discussions on these issues.
- **7. Grading:** Grades will be assigned based on the completion of all requirements for this course.

Submission of Assignments:

All assignments should be submitted via Sakai in the Assignment section. All submissions should be Times New Roman, 12 pt font, and double-spaced. Page amounts provided are meant to be recommendations. Students should feel free to write more if they feel they have more to say.

All viewpoints will be respected, but please note that everyone may not share your opinion on a particular topic. Additionally, this class is designed to be a safe space for *all* individuals regardless of gender, sexual orientation, race, ethnicity, nationality, physical or mental disability, or socioeconomic status.
