The aim of this course is to acquaint students with scientific research within the context of learning psychology. Upon successful completion of this course, students will

- · have a basic understanding of methods and techniques used in animal conditioning research
- understand the procedures for collecting data in animal conditioning research
- be able to use basic statistics and statistical software to analyze data
- be able to interpret the results of the statistical analyses
- produce an APA-style empirical paper.

#### Peer Review:

Students will conduct peer review sessions throughout the semester. The goal of these sessions is to practice your newly developed scientific writing skills by providing constructive feedback to your fellow classmates' lab reports.

### **Presentations:**

Students will work in groups in order to present two relevant articles of the group's choice to their fellow classmates. All students are expected to equally contribute both in the creation and presentation of the article. Presentations should be roughly 25 minutes in length and presented via PowerPoint. The emphasis on these presentations is not only properly summarizing the article, but to also present your group's critical reaction to the paper.

#### Quizzes:

Quizzes will be TAKE HOME and due at the beginning of the next class. They will be 15-20 minutes and worth a total of 20 points during the semester. These quizzes may be based on the articles for each experiment, APA style, and/or the basic statistics used with our data throughout the semester. If you do not turn in a Quiz WITH NO REASON OR EMAIL, you will be allotted a 0.

Critical Reflections: I expect all students to follow the honor pledge and complete the guizzes by themselves.
