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The Social Psychology of Gender Fall 2021

Tues (AR Lectures) & Thurs (SR class) 3:00-4:20

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Pre-Requisite: Psychology 321 (Social Psychology)

Course description: This course examines social psychological theories and research on how gender shapes self-conceptions and social interactions across many domains. Topics include evolutionary versus cultural accounts of gender phenomena, how and why attitudes toward the other gender are ambivalent, and the ways in which even positive female stereotypes tend to uphold the gender status quo. We consider how prescriptive stereotypes ("gender rules") result in social disapproval for gender deviance, and examine how gendered attitudes play out in the workplace and in romantic relationships. Throughout the course, we examine the prospects for continued change in gender roles, stereotypes, and hierarchy.

Goals: To provide an engaging, integrative, and broad overview of gender-related theory and research that can help students to understand the complex cross-currents underlying modern day gender relations and incorporate gender into their own areas of research interest.

Class Format:

Tuesday lectures are posted on YouTube. Follow the links provided below and watch them before each assignment is due. Thursdays we'll meet on Zoom to discuss assignments, readings, and lectures. I will email you a Canvas course announcement with a link to each meeting. Zoom accounts are free, although you don't need one. You do need a computer with decent Internet, a camera, and a microphone. Check your syllabus often. Not every Tuesday has a lecture, but there are still assigned readings or something else to do. Not every Thursday has an assignment due; sometimes we'll watch a film on Zoom and discuss it.

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<u>Course Evaluation</u>. There are no exams. Grades are based on class participation, 8 written assignments, and a final paper. Follow the instructions for each assignment, and be sure to weave course concepts into your essays to show me you've been watching lectures and doing the assigned reading. Be prepared to discuss your essays in class the day they are due, and use Canvas to submit them to me by class time. If you have to miss class, you must still submit your assignment by class time to earn full points. For all written assignments, use double spacing and only APA-approved font (12-point Times New Roman). Name your file Last Name, First Name Exercise X.pdf. For example: **Rudman, Laurie Exercise 7.pdf** (or .docx). See the last page of your syllabus for how grades are assigned.

<u>Final paper</u>. Submit it using Canvas no later than 5 pm on <u>Thursday</u>, <u>Dec 16th</u> (or email to me). This assignment requires you to choose a text from a list provided, or clear your selection with me. High scorers integrate the material from your chosen text with the concepts learned from the course (just as you've been practicing all semester) in a glorified book report. Aim for 6-10 double-spaced pages including a title page and a references page with at least 3 citations. Last page of syllabus has details.

Thursday, Dec 16: FINAL PAPER DUE by 5:00 pm. Remember to name all your files so it's easy for me to grade, and convert them to pdf to eliminate viruses if you can. Example: Rudman, Laurie Final Paper.pdf (or .docx).

Goal: Demonstrate that you can apply "gender lenses" to an independent reading by synthesizing it with concepts you've learned from the course. You've been practicing this skill with all your assignments. There is a list of suggested texts at the Canvas course site under Assignments, but you can choose your own if you clear it with me.

Style: Formal essay, but not "APA format." Do cite your references on a separate page in any format you like. Required: At least three references, one of which will be your chosen book; the other two can be your course textbook, other papers you read for the class, or even lecture slides. You can also cite material you found online, just be sure to include the link.

Mechanics: Double spaced, Times New Roman, 12-point font, 6-10 pages maximum. With a title page and a final page for references, this boils down to your having to write just 4 pages minimum, or 8 pages maximum.

Grading policies: Total points possible = 140. Extra credit is not an option. There are 8 Assignments worth 10 points each, and a final paper worth 60 points. Grades are based on percentage (not a curve), so everyone in the class can earn an A. The percentages (and total points) needed for your final grade are as follows: 90%=A (126), 85% = B+(119), 80% =B (112), 75% = C+ (105), 70%=C (98), 55% = D (77).
